ONE CHURCH—ONE MESSAGE: LENTEN MESSAGE SERIES

PURPOSE: Death to Self

Scripture: John 12:20-33

What does God want us to know? Perseverance leads to transformation by overcoming selfishness.

What does God want us to do? Engage in practices that challenge and diminish selfish tendencies, leading to a renewed self.

What does God want us to feel? A sense of liberation and renewal, emerging as a more selfless individual.

Perseverance helps us to put to death the selfish parts of ourselves. When we persevere, we kill the part of ourselves that is lazy and self-centered. **We persevere so that we will die to self and a new person will be raised.** We persevere so that we can live the glory of a resurrected life.

Second Reading: Son though he was, he learned obedience from what he suffered; and when he was made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him.

I Persevere: Grace/ God's Workmanship

This is the fifth and essentially final week of our series. Next week is Palm Sunday and traditionally there is no homily. This series has been all about the importance of perseverance: in our faith, in our relationship with Christ and with his Church. So through the course of this series we've been looking at how to persevere in our faith despite that challenge. And we've been looking at four key factors that can help. Three weeks ago we looked at the first one: We need connections, we need support to persevere in our faith. That seems obvious enough, but it is actually surprising how many people approach their faith and the practice of their faith as an entirely private exercise. But, we were never meant to try and grow and live our faith all alone and on our own. Two weeks ago, we looked at the importance of passion. Our savior was not this bland, banal boring guy. He had zeal for his mission and message. And he wants his friends and followers to have zeal for his mission and message too. We learned that Zeal and passion are fostered by exploring new spiritual practices or habits or doing old ones in slightly new again, which is precisely what this season of Lent is all about. Last week we looked at grace. Scripture tells us that through grace God fashions us into his handiwork. Which is given expression in our good work. God has specific work for us to do, work that only we can do. We persevere in our faith through this good work. So we looked at ways we discover those good works including serving in ministry. And we gave you a chance to take the step of ministry. Today we look at a fourth major factor when it comes to perseverance in faith. We're in the 12th chapter of John's gospel where we meet some Greeks, probably converts to Judaism who had come to Jerusalem on pilgrimage to worship at the Temple. They approach the apostle Phillip, whose name suggests he also was Greek. They ask him, "Sir, we would like to see Jesus." Phillip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Phillip went and told Jesus. The indication is that Jesus name and fame had spread considerably by this point. One more reason the religious leaders wanted him gone. Jesus answers: The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Amen, amen, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it produces much fruit. In some way, which John doesn't explain to us, the appearance of these Greek pilgrims signal to Jesus that a different time, a new time had arrived. He refers to this time as his "hour." Seven times in John's Gospel Jesus refers to his "hour" and each time he is referring of course to his passion and death on the cross. The analogy of the grain of wheat is a reminder of just why he must undertake this "hour," why he must go to the cross. The pain of the cross is the path to the resurrection. The defeat of the cross is the triumph over sin/death. Jesus goes on: Whoever loves his life loses it, and whoever hates his life in this world will preserve it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will my servant be. Here he applies the same pattern of his own cross to all those who would follow him: to preserve your life, you must "hate" your life in this "world." What does that mean? By "hate" he means detachment. And by world, he means the ways of the world, the ways of the world that tempt us away from following God and growing as disciples. The ways of the fallen and corrupt systems of the world that can trip us up and trap us time and time again. In fact, sometimes the ways of the world can present us challenges and choices that are really tests... tests of our faith and tests of our character. Whatever the circumstances and whatever the details, the challenge and the choice is always between. Faith and faithfulness through some kind of pain/suffering.

Or The avoidance of any kind of pain or suffering. There comes a time when we have to choose. Following Jesus might open ourselves up to criticism bring financial loss make us less popular at school Through the course of life, we are tested on whether we will choose to lay down our will and our wants and our ways (not to mention the ways of the world) for what God is calling us to do. And often times the choice is not between good and evil, black and white. It could involve objectively good things: a project you want too finally get done, but can only get done at the expense of someone else; like Sunday Mass. A promotion that will mean you can provide more/family, that unfairly passes over someone who deserves it. an opportunity that is great, offered under circumstances that are less than good. These tests are far more subtle and far less easy to resist. But big or small these choices and challenges are painful. How do you overcome the pain. How do you effectively, consistently resist... How do you effectively, consistently remain faithful He tells us...But it was for this purpose that I came to this hour. Jesus understands the reason he came was to obey the perfect will of his Father, to die and rise again. For the purpose of doing what we could not do for ourselves.... for the purpose of defeating sin and death. Purpose is a fourth major factor in persevering in our faith. People who have a clear sense of purpose/life are going to be more successful at living. We need a purpose more than anything. Man's Search for Meaning is a 1946 book by Victor Frankl chronicling his imprisonment in a Nazi concentration camp. He wrote at about the same time as Freud. Freud argued that the base line for every human being is the pleasure principle. We are constantly in search of pleasure. Frankl argued the opposite. Our greatest desire is for purpose and meaning. He observed this firsthand at the camp, seeing fellow prisoners questioning life, the universe, God.... about the meaning behind all the suffering they were experiencing. Those who didn't descend into despair eventually realized that rather than them questioning life they were the ones being questioned by the circumstances to recognize purpose through and beyond their suffering. Those who discovered purpose were precisely the ones who survived and often times helped others to survive too. People with a clear sense of purpose, when it comes to their faith stay focused on their faith even in the face of difficult challenges or hard choices. Our purpose in Christ, given to us by Christ is to Love God. Love Others. Make Disciples. Purpose helps us persevere through challenges. And it always goes beyond ourselves. When you persevere in your faith other people are watching. For some people you are the only Christian witness in their lives. Some of your co-workers have no idea that God sent his son to die for them. Some of your classmates did not grow up with faith in/ living Lord/loves them. Some of your neighbors, have no connection to a church family and are aching for that kind of support. Staying focused on your purpose in Christ impacts the people you know. Other people see your faith and they are inspired by it, especially those younger than you. Psychologists universally agree that at whatever age we all need role models from whom we discover or rediscover a sense of purpose. Your faithfulness to your purpose in Christ is important to you, it's important to us too. In these last days of Lent, as we sprint toward Easter perhaps I could just sum up this series and this season with encouragement to never lose that sense of purpose. Don't quit, don't give up/ and when you fall and when you fail, get back up and start over again when you're facing difficult even painful choices persevere in your purpose in Christ.

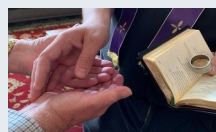
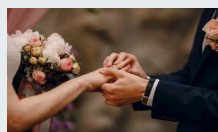
